The Secretary's New Zealand Report

## Import Cuts Less Drastic Than Feared

New Zealand's Import Schedule for the quota year July 1966/June 1967 was received by their businessmen with less despondency than had been anticipated. This was the opinion

of Mr. J. B. Kite, the Chamber's Secretary, who visited New Zealand on the recent inaugural flight between Auckland and Hong Kong.

Mr. Kite, who arrived in Auckland during the week in which the new scheilule was released attended a luncheon in which the Hon. N. L. Sheldon, Minister of Customs, made it clear that New Zealand's overseas reserve funds were down and imports would have to be cut. Among the typical comments which greeted the statement was, "The only reason that Government will accept for encouraging industrial development, is to reduce the need to import. We cannot do anything about improving exports and the produce items on which we rely are all handled by Government Boards."

To illustrate this point, the story was told of a merchant firm which had established a healthy and expanding export trade in dairy produce to the West Indies. The Dairy Production and Marketing Board decided to take over this trade, appoint a new agent, and since then, the trade has expanded only 10 per cent. as fast as it was expanding in merchant hands.

In Wellington, however, Mr. Kite found a more optimistic attitude. Here discussions were taking place between the Export Section of the New Zealand Apples and Pears Marketing Board and their Hong Kong

agent who was keen to increase the import of New Zealand apples to Hong Kong to some 5,000 cartons per month. At present shipping space exists for only 27,000 cartons per annum.

#### More N.Z. Meat?

The possibilities of a further exploration of the Hong Kong market for meat was also mentioned by a leading Auckland merchant. Although a regular trade in prime cuts for three leading hotels has been established further research is to be undertaken into marketing chilled meat for the Chinese population.

During these talks Mr Kite was told that was at present only a five months export season for beef. The reason, 'During the rest of the year the price on the home market is far too good."

Before returning to Hong Kong, Mr. Kite had talks with the Director and Secretary of the Sydney Chamber of Commerce and the Hong Kong tariff consultant in Australia. He also met Mr. W. E. Manson, the Hong Kong Government Representative in Australia and visited the offices of the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation, Messrs. Swire & Yuili and Messrs. Jardine Matheson & Co. Ltd.

#### CHAMBER'S PART IN BARCELONA

## Hong Kong Pavilion fully booked

For the first time Hong Kong is to take part in a Spanish trade fair, the Barcelona International Samples Fair, which will be held from June 1st to June 15th. Of the thirteen individual

exhibitors taking part, seven are Chamber members.

The Barcelona fair will be unique for Hong Kong in several respects. Apart from the fact that Hong Kong is taking more area than usual (almost 8,000 square feet), the Barcelona venture will be the first fair organised under the auspices of the new Trade Development Office.

The initial survey work for Barcelona was undertaken by Mr. L. Dunning, formerly of the Department of Commerce and Industry, and as a result an Italian firm of exhibitior contractors were appointed to design the Hong Kong area. A Spanish firm of public relations consultants have also been appointed.

#### Chamber Representation

At present, the Hong Kong delegation will be led by Dr. S. Y. Chung who will be assisted by Mr. L. Y. Leung. Mr. Dunning will also accompany the delegation as pavilion manager and Mr. W. Fish of Government Information Services will look after press relations. An assistant trade officer from D. C. & I. is also expected to accompany the mission.

Following a decision by the T.D.O. a 75 per cent subsidy toward the Barcelona — Hong Kong air fare will be made. Additional financial assistance will be given towards exhibitors freight and insurance costs.

Among the Chamber members expected to participate are: John Cowie & Co. Ltd., Hong Kong Carpets, Hertiwig, Carlton Enterprizes, World Flashlights, and Shenghsi Foo.

The Chamber will occupy a 100 square foot information stand next to the Trade Development Office area, near the entrance to the Hong Kong pavilion. Representing the Chamber at Barcelona will be one of the Assistant Secretaries, R. P. Wood, who is due to leave Hong Kong

on May 26th.

Mr. Wood previously represented the Chamber at the Lausanne National Fair and the Sydney International Trade Fair. He also took part in the first of the Government's previncial fortnightly displays at the

Birmingham Bull Ring. Members who have a particular enquiry regarding Spain are asked to contact Mr. Wood.

Spain has never been considered as one of Hong Kong's major European markets, indeed to quote a Trade Bulletin article (March 1966) Hong Kong has absorbed only an insignificant share of Spanish exports, and in absolute terms its share of Spanish imports is not very significant.

Yet since 1963, Hong Kong's exports to Spain have shown a dramatic rise from \$3,247,844 to \$14,579,024 in 1965, and there is

# LONDON T.D.O. REPRESENTATIVE IN HONG KONG

Mrs. I.M. Ward, Resident Representative of the Trade Development Office in the United Kingdom has arrived in Hong Kong for discussions with Mr. R.G.L. Oliphant and his staff.

Mrs. Ward, who was formerly in the Hong Kong Government's office in London and transferred to the T.D.O., will stay in the Colony for approximately two weeks. While here Mrs. Ward is anxious to discuss Hong Kong's trade with the United Kingdom with as many people as possible.

Commenting on a British store display of Hong Kong shirts, later in the week, Mrs. Ward was reported as having said the display was a "flop". She said the shirts were priced at 8s. 6d. of which none was sold on the first day and only one on the second day.

Mrs. Ward urged local manufacturers to improve the design and quality of their products. "We must not sacrifice these for cheap and shoddy articles."

## NEWS FROM D. C. & I.

U.S.A. - Revised Tariff Schedules

The United States and the United Kingdom have now signed an agreement granting new tariff concessions to offset increases in bound tariff items resulting from the introduction by the United States of a revised tariff schedule, the T.S.U.S.

As well as the United Kingdom's trade, Hong Kong's trade with the United States was affected by the revised tariff schedules. The United Kingdom Government have, therefore, also been negotiating tariff concessions on behalf of Hong Kong. The United Kingdom Government have been advised by the Hong Kong Government and an officer of the Commerce and Industry Department has been present at the negotiations in Geneva and Washington from time to time.

Inter alia, the United States Government have agreed three new concessions —  $\,$

Irish Republic (Mr. K. C. Tam, Tel. 442022)

The Government of the Irish Republic has announced that the Temporary Import Levy of 15% on a certain number of imports will continue in operation until 30th June, 1966. For details please see O.T.R. Circular No. 72/65 of 1st December, 1965.

Jamaica (Mr. D. Sum, Tel. 431233)

An amendment made to the list of exceptions to the Jamaican Open General Licence has the effect of placing imports of "spoons and forks of plastic, paper or wood (excluding wooden ice-cream spoons)" under specific licensing control. Hong Kong's domestic exports of tableware and household articles of plastic to Jamaica in 1965 were valued at \$96,230.

#### Malaysia

The department has just received a copy of the 1965 edition of The Straits Times Directory of Malaysia. The Directory contains in the main separate business directories covering all the states within the Federation of Malaysia plus details of public, foreign government, and local government agencies and organizations throughout Malaysia.

#### **Penang State Mission**

Twelve members of the Penang State Legislative Assembly and the State Executive Council will visit Hong Kong from May 2nd to May 5th. They will be in Hong Kong as part of a tour of South-East Asia with the prime objective of attracting industrial investment in Penang.

#### French Import Quotas, 1966

The Department has now received details of French 1966 quotas for imports from Hong Kong subject to discriminatory import restrictions.

The French Government have liberalized -

judo sets; kimonos; brassieres; binoculars and telescopes without prisms; dolls of plastic materials

They have also allocated quotas for all items (with the exception of watch cases and parts of watch cases) of interest to Hong Kong on the discriminatory import restrictions list; this was not the case last year when their failure to allocate quotas for certain items had the effect of a total import ban.

A further circular will be issued as soon as the French Government announce that applications for import licences may be made for the items still subject to restriction.

Mr. R. H. Stewart, leader of the New Zealand Manufacturers' Federation Trade Mission, accompanied by his colleagues, visited the Chamber for talks with Chamber members.

## That was Business That was

Passing through Hong Kong the other week was a British engineering trade mission who had flown East to visit Peking. The Chamber took the opportunity to contact them when they arrived in Hong Kong and although it was explained they were not particulary interested in building up specific trade with the Colony, the Chamber's facilities were effered.

But as a result of this chance opportunity, one member of the delegation casually mentioned he might be interested in electric drill chucks. Within two hours, Tudor Griffiths, the Assistant Secretary following up trade enquiries, had contacted a suitable Hong Kong manufacturer and a business deal was made for a considerable quantity of chucks.

Radio Hong Kong broadcast an interview between Mr. W. Pearman, Director of the Auckland Chamber of Commerce and Mr. Geoffrey Archer, Executive Director of The Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce. During the interview Mr. Pearman congratulated the Hong Kong Chamber for its co-operation with overseas visitors and stressed the need for closer relationship between the two Chambers.

#### RUSH FOR CERTIFICATES

A record number of Chamber certificates of origin was issued in the few days before the Easter holiday. The top figure was reached on April 7th. when 784 certificates were issued.

#### QUARANTINE

Quarantine restrictions have been imposed against arrivals from Dacca A and Palembang P because of smallpox. Rangoon has been removed from the list of cholera restricted ports. — Port Health Notice.

## PLASTICS SAFETY CODE

Endorsement of a D.C. & I statement calling for co-operation among plastic toy manufacturers to ensure that the lead content on their toys does not exceed a British Standards Institution measurement, was made by the Chamber.

The D.C. & I statement recommends that toy manufacturers whose products are intended for export to Britain should make sure that the maximum lead content for surface paints should not exceed 11,000 p.p.m. which is 1.1 per cent.

The statement adds that the British Government is at present considering legislation which will establish a maximum lead content for such surface paints and it is believed that this level will not exceed 1.1 per cent and may be possibly lower. The statement goes on to mention that over the past two years the Government has carried out a large number of tests for lead content in surface paints used on toys manufactured in Hong Kong for export and for sale in the domestic market.

#### Random Sampling

"While the majority of these have been satisfactory, there have been cases where the paints used to coat the surface of the toys contained lead in excess of the recommended maximum. The advice of the Director of Medical and Health Services is that such toys constitute a health hazard and he has advised that the use of unsuitable paints should be strongly discouraged."

D.C. & I add that since most

toy manufacturers are registered
with them for export certification purposes, it is administratively convenient for them to
co-ordinate the work of ensuring
that toy manufacturers are aware
of the need to work within recommended levels of lead content and that manufacturers are
in fact working in these safety
limits.

In order to provide a suitable system of testing and advice to the toy industry D.C. & I have decided to carry out representative sampling and testing of toys in production, or from stock, in registered factories. These samples will be submitted to the Government chemist for analysis.

Manufacturers will be advised of the results of these tests and, where any paint is considered unsuitable, will be requested to discontinue its use and, if necessary, to destroy any toys which might be considered to represent a health risk.

D.C. & I add that they are prepared to assist manufacturers who are unsure about the lead content in paints they propose to use and will arrange to have tests carried out on samples.

When D.C. & I announced this new move, the Star newspaper informed the Chamber that they had received several adverse comments on the theme that while the large manufacturers would co-operate many smaller unregistered factories would be able to continue as before. The Chamber's press attitude was that any move which would reduce the health hazard in a Hong Kong product was to be welcom-In particular, they had in mind the allegations of November and December against plastic toy tool sets and plastic water-

## Mr. R. G. L. Oliphant's Rotary Speech

## Hong Kong's Survival Depends on Selling

"The guiding principle of Export Promotion that I wish to adopt is that there is no substitute for salemen on the ground. We must not become a nation of shop-

keepers waiting behind counters for the customers to come in, unless we have invited them here and we have something to show them.

"We must go out into the markets of the world, and if necessary into the very homes of our customers. We must be aggressive in order to survive, and I shall not be content with mere survival; my aim is constant progress, notwithstanding such artificial restrictions as may be placed upon our trade.

"A basic programme for the year beginning this month, was approved by the Trade and Industry Advisory Board and the Working Committee on Export Promotion Organisation, and is now being implemented. It includes Trade Fairs in Barcelona, Stockholm, Bangkok and may be one more. It also includes displays in big department stores in England, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Germany and the U.S.A., whilst other projects are still under consideration.

"This programme is the maximum that can be undertaken by the staff I expect to have, but there is no reason why the Associations should not add to it with financial help from the Council, so long as projects fit into the overall plan. I should like to know about all private trade promotion activities both in Hong Kong and overseas, so that these may be integrated with the official programme and the maximum help may be given to and benefit derived from them.

"In the past we have done our best with limited resources of finance and personnel. Now I hope that both are going to be more plentiful. Although I do not intend to run the new organisation on military lines, I think that a military analogy most clearly expresses my plans. We have been sending out rather unrelated reconnaissance patrols, and we now have the means of mounting a sus-

tained offensive, but before a campaign of this nature can be mounted we must go through several unspectacular tasks, some of which have now been done.

## **Market Information**

"A great deal of preliminary work has already been done on these problems, and of course final decisions must be taken by the Council. But even when the answers have been found, there is still one further factor without which nothing can be achieved. I refer to your support. Without your support I can do nothing. I must know that you are behind me, without having to look over my shoulder, and not too far behind at that! I want you to be pushing me along, spurring me to greater efforts. As I see it, my job is first to select the most promising markets and the right products for them; and then to find out what type of promotion is really needed, in order to increase exports without cutting across established trade channels.

"Do not run away with the idea that I hope to build up a huge organisation. I do not; but I must have certain services, by which I mean access to adequate information on markets, our own products and productive capacity. If they are readily available in other organisations I shall make use of them. If they are not, then I may have to build them, but it will be my object to spend as much as possible of the funds at my disposal, on the actual promotion of trade.

"I am certain that insufficient attention has been paid in the past to the reports of previous Trade Missions, both as regards design, packing, packaging and also market opportunities. Several organisations have been considering assistance regarding the former deficiencies, and it is encouraging to hear of the

projected design centre in the Hong Kong Technical College.

"You probably know that the main Industrial and Commercial Associations are to be represented on the Trade Development Council, and you may have read the recent statement of the Financial Secretary, that out of 109,000 registered businesses in Hong Kong, some 47,-369 are large enough to be called upon to render tax returns. But do you know that the combined membership of the Federation of Hong Kong Industries, General Chamber of Commerce and Chinese Manufacturers Association, is well under 4,000?

## More Representation

"The Development Trade Council cannot listen to tens of thousands of individuals, but even the smallest should have a voice in the Council's affairs. Their spokesmen should be the Association representatives on the Council. If each member of the Associations that I have named, obtained 10 new members, they would be well on the way to representing the most active section of Trade and Industry. Is this too much to ask?

"There have been statements in the press lately regarding the claims to representation of other bodies representing sections of commerce and indus-There have been accusatry. tions against the Trade Development Council which does not yet exist because the legislation necessary to bring it into being has not yet been passed. All I would like to say on this subject is that my relations and those of my temporary organisation with these people, are excellent, and I have advised them how to present their case in the right quarter so that consideration may be given to allocating to them spare places on the Council.

Finally, the point above all others that I want you to remember is that it is YOU, the people of Hong Kong, who must do the selling of Hong Kong products. The Trade Development Council will choose the objectives, suggest the products, make the arrangements, supply you, publicise you and help to transport you, but YOU must make the sales. We can only give you the opportunities. Go out and sell!
