## Hong Kong's Programme for Tax Treaty negotiations in 2016

We refer to your letter of 4 March 2016 inviting recommendations on prospective jurisdictions that should be considered as part of Hong Kong's Comprehensive Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement ("CDTA") and Tax Information Exchange Agreement ("TIEA") networks as well as automatic exchange of financial account information in tax matters ("AEOI") on the condition that Hong Kong can put in place the necessary local legislation.

The Chamber would like to emphasize again that the pursuit of CDTA is in our greatest interest as this provides the advantage of facilitating and promoting cross-border trade and investment. On the other hand, TIEA is mainly concerned with the access of taxpayer information. With the foregoing in mind, and to capitalise on the opportunities arising from the Mainland's Belt and Road initiative, we would therefore recommend that the Government considers approaching jurisdictions that fall under the catchment area of this important national strategy.

According to the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, there are 65 jurisdictions that can be categorized as Belt and Road countries. We have already entered into or are in the midst of negotiating a CDTA with 20 of these jurisdictions.

We would recommend that the Government approaches the jurisdictions on the list attached on CDTA discussions for the purpose of further enhancing Hong Kong's role as a "super connector" for the flow of trade and investments from Mainland China to countries along Asia, Europe and Africa.
