## Official Lunch for Princess

For 500 members of the Chamber, the Federation and the Chinese Manufacturers' Association, one of the main events of British Week was the luncheon given in honour of H.R.H. the Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon at the City Hall on March 4th. The Governor and Lady Trench also attended the lunch.

On arrival at the City Hall, Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon were introduced to the Hon. G. R. Ross and Mr. Wong

Tak-sau, by the Hon. Sir Sik-nin Chau. Then the Princess and Lord Snowdon mingled with the committee members from the three associations at a short reception held before the nine-course Chinese lunch.

Welcoming the Princess, Sir Sik-nin Chau expressed appreciation to her for accepting their invitation, which he said showed her awareness of the importance of commerce and industry, without which the Colony could not have sustained itself and the immigrants it had taken 'under its wing'.

Sir Sik-nin then thanked the Princess for bringing a 'special glimpse of beauty, charm and grace into the ordinary lives of the people of Hong Kong'.

Two ceremonial jade rice bowls were then presented by Mr. Wong Tak-sau to the Princess along with two jade seals for Lord Snowdon. Descriptions of the presentation were broadcast direct from the City Hall over Radio Hong Kong.

## K. T. WOO TO TALK TO CHAMBER MEMBERS

The tremendous advantages to be gained in trading with the United States will be the theme of a talk open to all Chamber members which will be given by Mr. K.T. Woo, the Joint Public Relations Committee representative in America.

## H.K. Businessmen Hold 'Useful' Talks with C.B.I.

Taking the opportunity of the many visiting industrialists to Hong Kong for British Week, a conference was held on March 9 between a delegation from the Confederation of British Industry and a joint delegation from The Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce, the Federation of Hong Kong Industries and the Chinese Manufacturers' Association of Hong Kong.

There was a lively and useful exchange of views on current economic conditions and the possibilities of increasing trade in both directions with Great Britain.

The United Kingdom delegation sought and the Hong Kong representatives gave details, of matters that needed looking into

to improve British performance in the Hong Kong market and it was agreed that great attention should be paid to the question of maintaining promised delivery dates.

Considerable attention was given to the need for increased British participation in Hong Kong's industrial and capital development. The C.B.I. Delegation made it clear that British

industry is interested in such possibilities and would welcome proposals from Hong Kong industrialists.

The relationship between Great Britain and the European Economic Community and the possible effects to Hong Kong, if Britain should join the Common Market, were also closely examined. The C.B.I. Delegation noted the vital interests of Hong Kong in this possible development.

Mr. J. Douglas Hood, Chairman of the National Wool Textile Export Corporation led the delegation from the C.B.I. and shared the duties of chairman of the conference with the Hon. G. R. Ross. In addition to the chairmen, the opening speakers on the various subjects were, the Hon. Sir. Sik-nin Chau and Mr. Y. L. Yang from Hong Kong, and from the C.B.I., Mr. W. G. Pullen, (Chief General Manager of The Chartered Bank) Mr. W. D. Akester (Director, Ransomes, Sims & Jeffries) and Mr. M. R. L. Robinson (Group Manager, The De La Rue Co., Ltd.).

Members of both delegations agreed that this exchange of views had been most useful and it was felt that greater understanding and benefits for both sides would result. It was agreed that further meetings should be held as opportunity arises.

### Iowa Trade Mission

Members of the Iowa Trade Mission called at the Chamber's offices on March 8th. Although not personally interested in direct purchasing from Hong Kong, discussions were held on the possible development of the Colony's engineering industries.

Later in the week it was reported the Iowa mission had transacted business worth HK\$500,000 million during British Week. Mr. Martin Miller, organiser of the 54-man mission indicated this figure before his delegation left for Thailand, Manila and Honolulu.

## HONG KONG IN LONDON

A display of Hong Kong products, in London, timed to coincide with British Week in Hong Kong, was opened by Mr. John Davis, Chairman of the Confederation of British Industries, on March 3.

A special message conveying good wishes for the success of the display was sent to Mr. Davis by Mr. Geoffrey Archer, Executive Director of the Chamber. The message along with a televised and radio report of the display was broadcast throughout the Home Counties.

The display, which was held in the newly opened Hong Kong Trade Centre in Pall Mall, was part of a campaign to promote the theme of 'two-way' trade during British Week. Special leaflets emphasising the need for two-way trade were prepared by the Chamber in conjunction with BOAC who also arranged for a daily pictorial display of Princess Margaret's visit to Hong Kong to be shown in the centre's windows.

In his opening speech, Mr. Davis said, "Because Britain is known as the foremost trading nation of the world, she has to make it plain that only good can come from mutual, two-way trading."

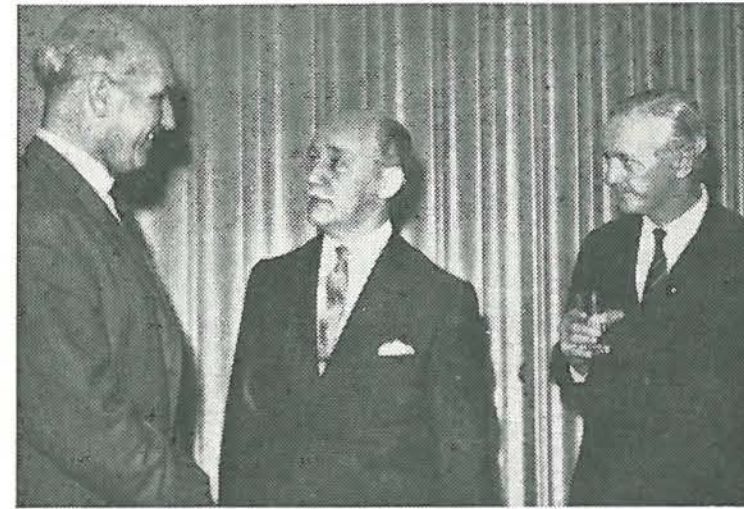

## THE LONDON CHAMBER'S BUSINESSMEN'S 'SPECIAL'

After an eight-hour delay during which time their aircraft flew over Hong Kong and was then diverted to Manila, the 89 members of the London Chamber of Commerce special British Week charter flight arrived in the Colony on March 2.

The mission was led by Mr. H. M. Bullard, who is in charge of the London Chamber's Asian section and consisted of buyers, importers and those on an exploratory visit.

The group was welcomed at Kai Tak by Mr. Geoffrey Archer, Executive Director of The Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce and Mr. F. Clark of the British Trade Commission. Special facilities were arranged by the Chamber for the mission to be escorted through the customs and immigration facilities and to be taken to the Mandarin Hotel.

In a brief statement, Mr. E. G. A. Grimwood former Director of the Hong Kong Office in London, and a director of John D. Hutchison (U.K.) Ltd, spoke of his close relationship with Hong Kong and the assurance he had that the people of Hong Kong would make British Week a success.

In each member's hotel room was a special letter of welcome from the Chairman in which he

brought out the theme of two-way trade and emphasised the willingness of the Chamber to collaborate and assist members of the mission.

As a direct follow-up to the mission's arrival, Mr. Archer made a broadcast over Radio Hong Kong in which he welcomed British Week as an opportunity for further trade with Britain and assured the London mission of the Chamber's full co-operation during their stay in Hong Kong. Mr. Archer answered possible criticisms of Britain, especially in relation to their poor delivery dates.

A further interview between Mr. Bullard and Mr. Archer has been arranged at the closure of British Week in which Mr. Bullard has promised that 'he has a few things to say about Hong Kong.'

Through the assistance of the Chamber, those members of the mission who were without established Hong Kong contacts were put in touch with local businessmen and throughout the week the Chamber received a steady stream of enquiries about local products.

It was estimated that almost two-thirds of the London Chamber's mission were in a position to buy Hong Kong products.

## LEICESTER CHAMBER'S VISIT

A reception followed by business talks was arranged for members of the Leicester Chamber of Commerce mission who visited the Chamber on March 7th.

The seven members of the Leicester mission were welcomed to the Chamber by the Hon. G. R. Ross, Mr. H. J. C. Browne, Mr. P. F. Watkinson, Mr. Lawrence Kadoorie, Mr. I. H. Kendall and Mr. A. J. Dodd. Afterwards they were entertained to lunch in the Chamber's boardroom.

A series of business discussions with interested Hong Kong parties was arranged, although the Leicester mission pointed out that they were principally in Hong Kong to sell.

The mission's interest in Hong Kong was emphasised by Mr. H. L. Milliard, Secretary of the Leicester Chamber, who said his delegation had been impressed by the efficiency and industrialisation of Hong Kong. Leicester, he pointed out, was estimated to be Britain's most prosperous city and that already they negotiated business to the value of £150,000 before arriving in Hong Kong.

### Commonwealth Preference Certificates and Certificates of Origin for Zambia

I have been informed by the Controller of Customs and Excise, Zambia that the four column tariff under which Hong Kong goods previously received preferential treatment has been replaced by a one column tariff which came into effect from 4th January, 1966. As from that date, Hong Kong goods to Zambia are no longer eligible for preferential treatment.

Under the new tariff, certificates of origin for Hong Kong goods exported to Zambia are not strictly required; but in order to avoid possible difficulties arising from their being confused with goods which might be liable to import control, it is recommended that companies exporting to Zambia should still cover their consignment with certificates of origin. Certificates of origin issued by this department, the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce, the Indian Chamber of Commerce and the Federation of Hong Kong Industries are acceptable to the Zambian Customs Authorities.

### Ghana: Import Licensing Regime

Details of Ghana's import licensing regime for the calendar year 1966 have recently been announced, and it is learned that, except under special circumstances, no applications will be entertained for import licences in respect of the following categories of goods which may be of interest to Hong Kong exporters:— Group plastic materials (regenerated cellulose, artificial resins); Refractory bricks and other refractory construction materials; Domestic utensils of iron or steel, enamelled; Domestic utensils of aluminium; Shirts other than knitted n.e.s.; Footwear with soles and uppers of rubber or plastic; Sun-shades.

Hong Kong's total domestic exports to Ghana in 1965 amounted to HK\$16 million, of which cotton yarn accounted for approximately HK\$12 million.

Base metal fittings and mountings of a kind suitable for furniture, doors, staircases, windows, blinds, coachwork saddlery, trunks, caskets, and the like, including automatic door-closers, base metal hat racks, hat pegs, brackets and the like excluding bolts, hasps and hinges. (Tariff Code 698 129)

### Decorated (Including Embroidered) Shirts and Similar Garments Manufactured From Certain Synthetic Fabrics

I refer to Commonwealth Preference Circular No. 11/62 of 6th December, 1962 in which you were advised that no Commonwealth Preference Certificates would be issued for shirts, non-embroidered blouses and similar garments made from non-Commonwealth origin fabrics wholly or partly of polyamide, acrylic or polyester fibres. This decision was relaxed when the department was prepared to issue Commonwealth Preference Certificates for embroidered shirts made of such fabrics, where the cost of embroidery is shown to constitute a significant portion of the Commonwealth cost of manufacture of the products.

Recent investigations revealed that embroidery on shirts is normally so slight that it cannot have a material effect on the Commonwealth content achieved by such articles. In the light of this, I have to inform you that the department will not issue 25% Commonwealth Preference Certificates for shirts of non-Commonwealth mixed or 100% polyamide, acrylic or polyester fibres, whether embroidered or otherwise decorated.
